Ensure you are aware of the correct courses and marks you require to get into the post-secondary option of your choice. What is your plan "B"?

If you are interested in a career in health, Grade 11 is the only year you can participate in the Health Internship Program – a 6-week paid summer internship.

Join extracurricular and volunteer activities at school and in your community to develop responsibility, teamwork and leadership skills – these will help later with scholarships, admittance to programs and resume writing. There are lots of one day opportunities!

If apprenticeship for a trade interests you as a post-secondary option, find out if you can start the RAP program. You could start your apprenticeship training while attending high school.

Begin by clarifying your top three trades

Plan a visit/research a variety of post-secondary institutions (2-3) that you may be interested in. Most institutions offer:

- Tours
- Open house events
- Evening informational session about a potential program of interest
- Student for a day opportunities

Research financial aid opportunities – consider getting summer employment, part-time work, scholarship, bursaries, grants, etc.

- Complete a practice application for a student loan. There are often a large number of documents required to apply and it is helpful to have these ahead of time.
- Talk about financial aid and student loan information with your parents.
- O Some financial aid programs are available for application in Grade 11
- Check out options for scholarships, grants or bursaries. Apply if applicable and listen closely to the May and June announcements for information.

● Look at the criteria for the Grade 12 scholarships, and plan to apply.

Make sure you work hard and get good grades. Sometimes conditional acceptances from post-secondary institutions are based on Grade 11 marks.

Update your Portfolio. Keep track of all the new academic, extracurricular and community work you have done since last year. Did you take a first aid or other community courses? If so, make a copy of any course certificates and place them in your portfolio.
